



Workshop on Human Rights and the Law of the Sea

IMO International Maritime Law Institute Stockton Center for International Law, U.S. Naval War College

13-14 February 2018

Purpose: To generate a stronger and shared understanding of human rights and the law of the sea; develop the rule of law and respect for human rights in the maritime domain, and strengthen collaboration between the Stockton Center and IMO IMLI.

Workshop Theme: "Human Rights and Law of the Sea": The workshop focuses on legal aspects of the most pressing issues in human rights and law of the sea, including responses to irregular maritime migration, maritime piracy, IUU fishing, and standards for the use of force at sea.

Format: Unlike a conference, this workshop is designed to facilitate interaction and engagement and to generate a deeper discussion.

Outcome: The proceedings of the workshop will be submitted by Professor David Attard and Professor James Kraska to the Routledge series, <u>IMLI Studies in International Maritime Law</u>. Selected participants will be invited to submit an article for peer-review publication in <u>International Law Studies</u>, published at the Naval War College since 1895.

Participation: Participation is by invitation only and include students, scholars and practitioners from or sponsored by the NWC SCIL and IMO IMLI.
